Components Studied

Component 1: Performing Music

In this component, you explore solo and ensemble performances. These will be explored through practical, instrumental performance and computer based technology performances

Component 2: Composing Music

In this component, you will compose two pieces of music and explore a variety of short compositional tasks.

Component 3: Appraising Music

There are four main areas of study within component 1:

- Musical Forms and Devices
- Music for Ensemble
- Film Music
- Popular Music
